Message to the Community

As we reflect on 2024, we are proud to share how the YMCA of the National Capital Region has continued to serve, support, and uplift our community during a time of ongoing change and challenge. We are rooted in purpose and growing with impact.

This year, the Y directly served over 51,800 people across our region—a 23 per cent increase from last year and a powerful testament to the continued relevance of our programs and services. From housing to child care, from employment to newcomer services, every program and initiative is guided by our mission: to contribute to a vibrant and inclusive community by providing individuals with equitable access to the services, supports and opportunities they need to thrive.

We are especially proud of the impact we've made in the following areas.

- Newcomer Services reached nearly 19,400 individuals, helping them find their footing in a new country through language, employment, and settlement support.
- Our Employment Services supported more than 12,800 people with continued innovation in trades training. Notably, 97% of graduates from our trades programs came from underrepresented communities.
- Camp participation more than doubled to 10,600 campers from 2023 to 2024. This
 was accomplished with additional Neighbourhood Day Camp locations, school
 programming, and specialty days in partnership with Employment and Newcomer
 Services. 277 children attended thanks to financial support from our generous donors.
- In our child care programs, we cared for 477 children from 320 families across licensed and after-school settings, providing families with safe, nurturing environments.
- Our Housing Services supported 494 individuals, including youth and newcomers, through emergency and transition-from-shelter housing.
- Financial assistance totalling more than \$189,000 ensured that cost was not a barrier for those most in need of our camp and health and fitness services. This was made possible by our generous donors.

We also recognize the need to adapt continuously. This year, our Family Shelter program concluded in the summer, and our Transitional Housing support for newcomers and women expanded. These changes reflect our community's evolving needs and our commitment to delivering services where they're most urgently required.

Looking ahead, we are focused on deepening and expanding our impact, fostering inclusion, and ensuring that everyone—regardless of age, background, or circumstance—has access to the tools and opportunities they need to thrive.

The YMCA of the National Capital Region launched a comprehensive community, staff, and stakeholder engagement process throughout 2024. This was the beginning of a new strategic path forward.



Our process included organizational analysis, community needs assessment, client and staff surveys, focus groups and stakeholder consultations. We embarked on an ambitious journey to develop a new strategic plan and vision.



The Vision, Mission and Values of our YMCA were reviewed, reflected on and modernized. They now better reflect the realities of the communities within the National Capital Region. These are accompanied by new strategies focused on equity, staff engagement, and client experience.



The new 2025-2030 Strategic Plan was finalized and approved in December 2024.



Rooted in Purpose, Growing with Impact:

Gabrielle's Story

Gabrielle was a devoted human rights activist in Haiti, meeting her community's needs on the frontlines. She advocated for survivors of sexual assault, provided literacy education to women and girls, and distributed hospital materials — just to scratch the surface.

Well-known for her community leadership, Gabrielle was invited to speak as a guest lecturer at the University of Toronto. Meanwhile, political tensions were rising in Haiti, and she was facing increased threats for supporting victims of violence. She decided that staying in Canada was the safest option for herself, her 10-year-old daughter, and her 4-year-old son.

In July 2024, Gabrielle requested refugee status, starting a sudden new chapter in her family's story. "I wasn't ready. I left everything behind because it wasn't my plan to stay. I didn't know how I would do it."

Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada provided a temporary room at a hotel in Ottawa. Here, she was introduced to Fatme from the Y, who explained the support available to her. "When you move, the first person you meet decides what your next step will be. I am eternally grateful to Fatme for being such a kind human being."

The Y Employment and Newcomer Services team helped Gabrielle structure her resume and shared valuable information about living in Canada, such as how to get a bus pass and dress for the winter. She wanted to give back to the Y, so after getting her work permit, she decided to begin volunteering with the team.

A few weeks later, a Customer Service Specialist position opened at the Y Employment Access Centre. Gabrielle took the chance to apply and officially began her first job in Canada. "I cried tears of joy because all I needed was one chance, and that's exactly what the YMCA gave me — a chance to begin again."

Finding housing wasn't easy, but Gabrielle was diligent and finally had an application accepted in March 2025. With most of her resources going to

rent and caring for her children, she wasn't able to furnish her apartment on her own. But her team had her back, donating what they didn't need. "My place is well-furnished because of my colleagues. Everyone brought something."

Gabrielle has many goals for the future. She aims to become a Permanent Resident, along with her children. She is working to build community spaces for Haitians in Ottawa. She envisions someday returning to school for social work or law, with social justice always driving her forward.

"Starting over in a new country is never easy, especially as a single mother of two, but I am fortunate to have the right people by my side. I feel truly blessed for everything I've been given, and I'm excited for the future ahead."

Rooted in Purpose, Growing with Impact

Ken's Story

Ken was born and raised in Burundi, where he dedicated much of his time to studying political science and international relations. In 2023, at the age of 23, he made the life-changing decision to move to Canada — a step he knew was necessary for his safety, though it came with many challenges.

After arriving in Canada, Ken spent his first few months living in shelters, where he gradually adjusted to a new culture, food, and cold weather. One day, a fellow resident told him about the YMCA's Second Stage Housing Program for Youth. Intrigued by the program's supportive approach, Ken saw an opportunity to build a better future and submitted an application.

"I was anxious about coming to the Y, but I was also excited."

In February 2024, he moved into the Shenkman Residence at the Taggart Family Y. Here, he connected with other youth who have similar experiences to him, including some from Burundi. With support from Y staff, he created a personalized goal plan and was connected to the resources he needed. Having one-on-one support made a difference beyond reaching his goals — it lightened the load of daily life.

"Sometimes it kind of feels like therapy, just having someone to talk to."

Ken has already achieved major milestones since moving to the Y. He completed a culinary training certificate at Chef Ric's along with two weeks of mentorship. He's been working with the team ever since, enjoying the chance to meet people from diverse backgrounds. He's also earned his G1 driver's license and taken part in the Second Stage Housing Program's life skills workshops, finding the sessions on financial literacy and housing especially valuable.

Having access to health and fitness facilities has been another important part of his journey, benefitting not only his physical health, but also his mental health. "If I'm having problems or not feeling well, going to the gym is a relief."

Ken is proud of how far he's come and has many goals for the future. He's working toward permanent residency, plans to secure independent housing, and dreams of going back to school to expand his knowledge and career opportunities. With the right environment, support, and determination, Ken is taking big steps to build a future full of promise.

"I'm grateful to the YMCA team for the remarkable work they do to help us progress in our lives."
